100 Examples of English Narration Change with Analysis

Simple Statements (Present to Past)

1.

Direct: She said, "I am tired."

Indirect: She said that she was tired.

Analysis: Present continuous \rightarrow Past continuous; pronoun "I" \rightarrow "she".

2.

Direct: He said, "I like ice cream."

Indirect: He said that he liked ice cream. **Analysis:** Present simple \rightarrow Past simple.

3.

Direct: They said, "We are busy."

Indirect: They said that they were busy.

Analysis: Present continuous \rightarrow Past continuous.

4.

Direct: I said, "She sings well."

Indirect: I said that she sang well.

Analysis: Present simple \rightarrow Past simple.

5.

Direct: He said, "It is raining."

Indirect: He said that it was raining.

Analysis: Present continuous → Past continuous.

Direct: She said, "I know the answer."

Indirect: She said that she knew the answer. **Analysis:** Present simple \rightarrow Past simple.

7.

Direct: The teacher said, "The earth is round." Indirect: The teacher said that the earth is round. **Analysis:** Universal truth → No tense change.

8.

Direct: He said, "I am reading a novel."

Indirect: He said that he was reading a novel.

Analysis: Present continuous \rightarrow Past continuous.

9.

Direct: She said, "I don't like coffee."

Indirect: She said that she didn't like coffee. **Analysis:** Present negative \rightarrow Past negative.

10.

Direct: They said, "We play football every Sunday."

Indirect: They said that they played football every Sunday.

Analysis: Present habitual → Past habitual.

Past Tense & Future Tense Statements

11.

Direct: She said, "I went to the market yesterday."

Indirect: She said that she had gone to the market the previous day.

Analysis: Past simple \rightarrow Past perfect; "yesterday" \rightarrow "the previous day".

Direct: He said, "I saw him last week."

Indirect: He said that he had seen him the previous week.

Analysis: Past simple \rightarrow Past perfect; "last week" \rightarrow "the previous week".

13.

Direct: They said, "We lived in Delhi in 2015."

Indirect: They said that they had lived in Delhi in 2015.

Analysis: Past simple \rightarrow Past perfect (time reference kept).

14.

Direct: She said, "I was reading when you came."

Indirect: She said that she had been reading when I came.

Analysis: Past continuous \rightarrow Past perfect continuous.

15.

Direct: He said, "I was working on the project."

Indirect: He said that he had been working on the project.

Analysis: Past continuous → Past perfect continuous.

16.

Direct: She said, "I had finished my homework."

Indirect: She said that she had finished her homework.

Analysis: Past perfect \rightarrow Remains past perfect (no change).

17.

Direct: They said, "We had been waiting for two hours."

Indirect: They said that they had been waiting for two hours.

Analysis: Past perfect continuous \rightarrow No change.

Direct: He said, "I will call you tomorrow."

Indirect: He said that he would call me the next day.

Analysis: "Will" \rightarrow "Would"; "tomorrow" \rightarrow "the next day".

19.

Direct: She said, "We shall meet again."

Indirect: She said that they would meet again.

Analysis: "Shall" → "Would".

20.

Direct: They said, "We will travel to London next year."

Indirect: They said that they would travel to London the following year.

Analysis: "Will" \rightarrow "Would"; "next year" \rightarrow "the following year".

21.

Direct: He said, "I shall return soon."

Indirect: He said that he would return soon.

Analysis: Future simple \rightarrow Future-in-the-past (*would*).

22.

Direct: She said, "We shall overcome the problem."

Indirect: She said that they would overcome the problem.

Analysis: "Shall" → "Would".

23.

Direct: He said, "I will help you."

Indirect: He said that he would help me.

Analysis: "Will" → "Would"; pronoun "you" → "me".

Direct: They said, "We shall be late."

Indirect: They said that they would be late.

Analysis: Future simple \rightarrow Would.

25.

Direct: She said, "I will go shopping today."

Indirect: She said that she would go shopping that day.

Analysis: "Today" \rightarrow "That day".

26.

Direct: He said, "I will buy a new phone."

Indirect: He said that he would buy a new phone.

Analysis: "Will" → "Would".

27.

Direct: She said, "I shall meet my friend here."

Indirect: She said that she would meet her friend there.

Analysis: "Here" \rightarrow "There".

28.

Direct: They said, "We will arrive tonight."

Indirect: They said that they would arrive that night.

Analysis: "Tonight" \rightarrow "That night".

29.

Direct: He said, "I shall start my new job next month."

Indirect: He said that he would start his new job the following month.

Analysis: "Next month" \rightarrow "The following month".

Direct: She said, "I will write a letter soon."

Indirect: She said that she would write a letter soon.

Analysis: "Will" → "Would".

Questions (Yes/No)

31.

Direct: She said, "Are you coming with me?" Indirect: She asked if I was coming with her.

Analysis: Yes/No \rightarrow use *if/whether*; pronoun "you" \rightarrow "I"; tense shift.

32.

Direct: He said, "Do you like music?" Indirect: He asked if I liked music.

Analysis: Present simple → Past simple; "Do" removed.

33.

Direct: They said, "Is it raining?"

Indirect: They asked if it was raining.

Analysis: Yes/No $\rightarrow if$ + inversion corrected.

34.

Direct: She said, "Can you help me?" Indirect: She asked if I could help her.

Analysis: Modal "can" → "could"; pronoun change.

35.

Direct: He said, "Will you come tomorrow?"

Indirect: He asked if I would come the next day.

Analysis: "Will" \rightarrow "Would"; "tomorrow" \rightarrow "the next day".

Direct: She said, "Are they here?"

Indirect: She asked if they were there. **Analysis:** Yes/No; "here" \rightarrow "there".

37.

Direct: He said, "May I leave now?"

Indirect: He asked if he might leave then.

Analysis: "May" \rightarrow "Might"; "now" \rightarrow "then".

38.

Direct: They said, "Have you seen the movie?"

Indirect: They asked if I had seen the movie.

Analysis: Present perfect \rightarrow Past perfect.

39.

Direct: She said, "Did you meet him yesterday?"

Indirect: She asked if I had met him the previous day.

Analysis: Past simple \rightarrow Past perfect; "yesterday" \rightarrow "previous day".

40.

Direct: He said, "Shall we start now?"

Indirect: He asked if they should start then.

Analysis: "Shall" → "Should".

Wh- Questions

41.

Direct: She said, "Where are you going?"

Indirect: She asked where I was going.

Analysis: Wh-word retained; tense shift present \rightarrow past.

Direct: He said, "What is your name?" Indirect: He asked what my name was.

Analysis: Wh-word "what" retained; word order normal.

43.

Direct: They said, "When will you arrive?" Indirect: They asked when I would arrive.

Analysis: "Will" → "Would".

44.

Direct: She said, "Why are you late?" Indirect: She asked why I was late.

Analysis: Wh-word "why" retained; tense present \rightarrow past.

45.

Direct: He said, "How do you solve this problem?" Indirect: He asked how I solved that problem. **Analysis:** Present \rightarrow Past; "this" \rightarrow "that".

46.

Direct: She said, "Which book do you prefer?" Indirect: She asked which book I preferred.

Analysis: Wh-question simplified; tense shift applied.

47.

Direct: He said, "Who is at the door?" Indirect: He asked who was at the door. **Analysis:** Wh-word remains; tense shift.

Direct: They said, "Whose car is this?"

Indirect: They asked whose car that was.

Analysis: "This" \rightarrow "That"; word order normal.

49.

Direct: She said, "What are you doing now?"

Indirect: She asked what I was doing then.

Analysis: Present continuous \rightarrow Past continuous; "now" \rightarrow "then".

50.

Direct: He said, "Where did you go last night?"

Indirect: He asked where I had gone the previous night.

Analysis: Past simple → Past perfect; "last night" → "previous night".

Commands & Requests

51.

Direct: She said, "Close the door."

Indirect: She told me to close the door.

Analysis: Imperative $\rightarrow told + object + to + verb$.

52.

Direct: He said, "Please help me."

Indirect: He requested me to help him.

Analysis: "Please" \rightarrow *requested*; pronoun change.

53.

Direct: The teacher said, "Stand up."

Indirect: The teacher ordered us to stand up.

Analysis: Strong imperative \rightarrow *ordered*.

Direct: She said, "Don't make noise."

Indirect: She told them not to make noise.

Analysis: Negative imperative \rightarrow *not to* + *verb*.

55.

Direct: He said, "Let me go."

Indirect: He requested to be allowed to go.

Analysis: Special imperative \rightarrow "let" becomes to be allowed.

56.

Direct: She said, "Don't tell a lie."

Indirect: She advised me not to tell a lie.

Analysis: Negative + moral \rightarrow *advised not to*.

57.

Direct: He said, "Please wait for me."

Indirect: He requested me to wait for him. **Analysis:** "Please" softens \rightarrow requested.

58.

Direct: They said, "Sit quietly."

Indirect: They instructed us to sit quietly. **Analysis:** Neutral imperative \rightarrow *instructed*.

59.

Direct: The doctor said, "Take this medicine."

Indirect: The doctor advised me to take that medicine. **Analysis:** Instruction in medical context \rightarrow *advised*.

Direct: Father said, "Work hard."

Indirect: Father advised me to work hard.

Analysis: Imperative as suggestion \rightarrow *advised*.

Orders, Advice, Warnings, Proposals

61.

Direct: The captain said, "Attack the enemy."

Indirect: The captain commanded the soldiers to attack the enemy.

Analysis: Strong imperative \rightarrow *commanded*.

62.

Direct: The teacher said, "Don't be late."

Indirect: The teacher warned us not to be late. **Analysis:** Negative advice \rightarrow *warned not to*.

63.

Direct: He said, "Drive carefully."

Indirect: He advised me to drive carefully.

Analysis: Imperative as suggestion \rightarrow *advised*.

64.

Direct: She said, "Beware of thieves."

Indirect: She warned me to beware of thieves.

Analysis: Warning \rightarrow *warned*.

65.

Direct: The officer said, "March forward."

Indirect: The officer ordered them to march forward.

Analysis: Military context \rightarrow *ordered*.

Direct: He said, "Don't waste time."

Indirect: He advised me not to waste time.

Analysis: Negative moral imperative.

67.

Direct: She said, "Always speak the truth."

Indirect: She advised me to always speak the truth.

Analysis: Universal value $\rightarrow advised$.

68.

Direct: The manager said, "Submit your report by Monday."

Indirect: The manager instructed us to submit our report by Monday.

Analysis: Formal instruction \rightarrow *instructed*.

69.

Direct: The old man said, "Help the poor."

Indirect: The old man urged us to help the poor.

Analysis: Strong appeal $\rightarrow urged$.

70.

Direct: He said, "Let's go for a walk."

Indirect: He proposed that we should go for a walk.

Analysis: "Let's" (suggestion) \rightarrow proposed that we should.

Exclamations & Interjections

71.

Direct: She said, "Wow! What a beautiful painting!"

Indirect: She exclaimed with wonder that it was a very beautiful painting.

Analysis: Exclamatory \rightarrow exclaimed with wonder; "what a" \rightarrow "very".

Direct: He said, "Alas! My friend is dead."

Indirect: He exclaimed with sorrow that his friend was dead.

Analysis: $Alas \rightarrow exclaimed with sorrow.$

73.

Direct: They said, "Hurrah! We have won the match."

Indirect: They exclaimed with joy that they had won the match.

Analysis: $Hurrah \rightarrow exclaimed with joy;$ tense shifted.

74.

Direct: She said, "Oh no! I missed the train."

Indirect: She exclaimed with regret that she had missed the train.

Analysis: "Oh no" \rightarrow regret; past perfect used.

75.

Direct: He said, "What a pity you lost the chance!"

Indirect: He exclaimed with sorrow that it was a pity I had lost the chance.

Analysis: "What a pity" \rightarrow sorrow expression.

76.

Direct: She said, "How intelligent you are!"

Indirect: She exclaimed with admiration that I was very intelligent.

Analysis: "How" \rightarrow "very"; admiration marker.

77.

Direct: He said, "Bravo! You did well."

Indirect: He applauded me saying that I had done well.

Analysis: "Bravo" \rightarrow applauded.

Direct: She said, "What a nice day it is!"

Indirect: She exclaimed with joy that it was a very nice day.

Analysis: Present \rightarrow Past; "what a" \rightarrow "very".

79.

Direct: They said, "Alas! We lost the game."

Indirect: They exclaimed with sorrow that they had lost the game.

Analysis: "Alas" \rightarrow sorrow; Past \rightarrow Past Perfect.

80.

Direct: He said, "Hurrah! India won the match."

Indirect: He exclaimed with joy that India had won the match.

Analysis: "Hurrah" \rightarrow joy; Past \rightarrow Past Perfect.

Optative & Mixed Expressions

81.

Direct: She said, "May God bless you."

Indirect: She prayed that God might bless me.

Analysis: Optative \rightarrow *prayed that* + might.

82.

Direct: He said, "May you succeed in life."

Indirect: He wished that I might succeed in life.

Analysis: Optative \rightarrow *wished that.*

83.

Direct: They said, "May peace prevails everywhere."

Indirect: They prayed that peace might prevail everywhere.

Analysis: Optative \rightarrow *prayed that.*

Direct: She said, "Long live the King."

Indirect: She wished that the King might live long.

Analysis: Optative \rightarrow *wished that.*

85.

Direct: He said, "May your dreams come true."

Indirect: He wished that my dreams might come true.

Analysis: Optative \rightarrow *wished that.*

86.

Direct: She said, "Would that I were rich!"

Indirect: She wished that she had been rich.

Analysis: Optative "would that" \rightarrow *wished that*.

87.

Direct: He said, "If only I could fly!" Indirect: He wished that he could fly. **Analysis:** If only \rightarrow wish construction.

88.

Direct: They said, "May you have a safe journey."

Indirect: They wished me a safe journey.

Analysis: Optative \rightarrow *wished*.

89.

Direct: The old man said, "May God protect the children."

Indirect: The old man prayed that God might protect the children.

Analysis: Optative \rightarrow *prayed that.*

Direct: She said, "Would that I had studied harder!" Indirect: She wished that she had studied harder.

Analysis: Past regret expressed → wished that.

Special Cases

91.

Direct: The teacher said, "The sun rises in the east." Indirect: The teacher said that the sun rises in the east.

Analysis: Universal truth \rightarrow *No tense change.*

92.

Direct: He said, "Two and two make four."

Indirect: He said that two and two make four.

Analysis: Mathematical fact \rightarrow *No tense change*.

93.

Direct: She said, "Honesty is the best policy." Indirect: She said that honesty is the best policy. **Analysis:** Proverb/Universal \rightarrow *No change*.

94.

Direct: The guide said, "The earth moves around the sun." Indirect: The guide said that the earth moves around the sun.

Analysis: Scientific fact \rightarrow *No tense shift*.

95.

Direct: He said, "I could swim when I was young."

Indirect: He said that he could swim when he was young.

Analysis: "Could" remains same (modal past → unchanged).

Direct: She said, "I should study more."

Indirect: She said that she should study more.

Analysis: "Should" remains unchanged (modal).

97.

Direct: He said, "I might go to Delhi tomorrow."

Indirect: He said that he might go to Delhi the next day.

Analysis: *Might remains unchanged*; time word \rightarrow "tomorrow" \rightarrow "the next day".

98.

Direct: She said, "Must I finish this today?"

Indirect: She asked if she must finish that day.

Analysis: "*Must*" *stays unchanged*, "today" → "that day".

99.

Direct: The boy said, "I ought to respect my parents."

Indirect: The boy said that he ought to respect his parents.

Analysis: Modal "ought to" → unchanged.

100.

Indirect → Direct Conversion Example

Indirect: He said that he was very tired.

Direct: He said, "I am very tired."

Analysis: Reverse change: Pronoun "he" \rightarrow "I"; tense was \rightarrow am.
